

#### Greetings from the Track,

I trust as we near the end of Summer 2024 (yikes!) that you had an opportunity to enjoy time away with family and friends. Over the last month, MRAS hosted a number of events including the 117th - Priddis Millarville Fair and the Okotoks Pro Rodeo. I had an opportunity to visit the Fair on Saturday and was amazed at the number of exhibitors and the variety of departments with overall attendance well ahead of last year by 23%. Well done Fair Committee! Also, the OK Pro Rodeo was sold out!

However, the season is not over - we have continued to see great attendance at the Millarville Summer Market along with new vendors and the number of Campground visitors is also seeing increased numbers. All this is not possible without great staff and volunteers.

Thank you to Dan for pushing forward with grant applications and as such MRAS was awarded a \$66,474 Agricultural Societies Infrastructure Revitalization Program grant towards a \$87,000 allocated toward the purchase and installation of a public address system throughout the MRAS site. This system will enhance our ability to broadcast messages in case of adverse weather events, missing children and other safety concerns in the MRAS grounds. Thank you to Dan and crew for initiating this.

The MRAS is making small steps towards finalizing the plans toward the large capital projects - Arena Build out (Phase 2a), solar installation and relooking at the arena footing. No firm decisions have been made, but we are getting closer on pricing and timing. More to come.



<u>Riding Rules:</u> These have been created and agreed upon to ensure everyone using the facility remains safe and that our facility can be kept in great condition. 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## MILLARVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY



On Sunday September 15, the Millarville Historical Society and the Dierkens family invite members to visit the historic buildings. We will start with a PowerPoint presentation and talk at the Church House at 1:00 pm, then proceed to the farm for a tour of the barns and the Edwardian house.

The old Macklin Place holds many historic memories, from the mid 1890s to the present day. Recently purchased by Steve and Julie Dierkens, the historic barns are being restored, and new fences and roads now grace the property. Beautifully set into the big hills with natural springs, this farm has many stories to tell.

It was originally homesteaded in 1893 by Frederick Hova Wolley Dod, the avid entomologist who cataloged hundreds of species of moths and butterflies of the area and sent mounted specimens to the great museums of the world between 1895 and 1917. He published the definitive 'Lepidoptera of Alberta' in 1910. He was the foremost entomologist in Western Canada for over 20 years.

In 1912, he built the beautiful 2 storey Edwardian house with all modern conveniences, with file cupboards and collecting rooms for his beloved butterflies. He also built several barns and outbuildings that still stand today. Sadly, Mr Dod went off to WWI in 1917 and did not return, dying in Mesopotamia in 1919.

Dr. Thomas Macklin and his son Hugh took up the property in 1921, and it was the Macklin Place for almost 50 years. Hugh and Dessa were stalwart members of the Millarville community their whole lives. In 1951, their sons Jack and Alec built the big dairy barn that we still see today. 

# AS WE COME INTO HARVEST TIME

#### I didn't write this but thought it important to share:

Harvest 2024 has begun. If you all who are not farmers wanted to know what the price of wheat is right now, it is \$5.40 a bushel..... **Value of US Dollar:** As wheat prices are primarily denominated in US dollars, fluctuations in the value of the dollar can impact the effective price of wheat for importing countries, influencing demand dynamics.

It's about the same as it was in 1972 which was - \$4.86 a bushel. A loaf of bread in 1972 cost 25 Cents.

A bushel of wheat yields 42 one-and-a-half pound commercial loaves of white bread OR about 90 one-pound loaves of whole wheat bread. A bushel of wheat makes about 42 pounds of pasta or 210 servings of spaghetti. There is approximately 16 ounces of flour in a one-and-a-half-pound loaf of bread.

You can buy a loaf of bread for \$7 today. \$294 for 42 loaves of bread if they cost \$7. The farmer gets 5.40 per bushel minus the storage fee. He is the one who grows the wheat. The one who is a steward of the ground the wheat grows in. The one who hires people to help him cut his crop. The one who spends hours on the combine and tractors to feed the world. The one who makes payments on his equipment his whole life, and he makes \$5.40 per bushel. We are feeding the world, and we can't afford to buy the bread back to make our own sandwiches. Things are not right in this world.

I would like to add that the suicide rate for farmers is quite high when things are this bad. Please pray for the farmers who are trying to feed the world.

As our historical society is not a political group, I thought this introduction was pertinent even though I did not write it. In our district, we get to look back at how we got here, as understanding history is the prescription for a better tomorrow.

#### I did write this.....

Let us pretend that we could go to an agriculturally rich country today and for the sum of \$10 get 160 acres of land and the opportunity of getting another 160 acres (Pre emption) for an additional \$10.

Now all you had to do was plough up 10 acres of that land and sew it to crop each year for three years. In your spare time you had to build a habitable building that contained a stove, table, and a bed. If you did this, you could lay claim to the additional 160 acres (The Pre emption). Now would you leave family and the nice warm home of your parents and undertake this challenge?

That is exactly what our pioneer ancestors did in this very country. They could catch a harvest train in the east. This was a train heading west. You could squeeze into a bench seat made for two but holding three individuals. The seat was wood slats that provided extreme comfort and support. You could use the small square stove at the back of the train that is shared by all to heat your porridge, tea, or possibly bacon. Sleeping? Well, that would have been plain Hell, and many got off the train in places like Brandon, as farmers looking for labourers came on the train to hire. A few days work and then deciding the train is not feasible, so you take off walking through Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and possibly Alberta, even though they have a different name than now. The benefit that you get, a road view of the country and the friendliness of the inhabitants. Short days of work for food would sustain your travels.


Once you seen a section of the country that appealed you went to the Dominion Land Office and got an idea of where you could go and look at your prospective land. The best way was to locate the survey stakes that marked the train right of way. Once orientated, you could look for the iron stakes that were in the northeast corner of each Section of land. Once you locate the stakes then you had to decipher the roman numerals engraved on the side of each stake. Now, if the stakes were rusted then you had a new problem to conquer. If you could have afforded it you could have a tent, but most slept on the ground with a blanket. Food was what could be carried or caught. The problem now is that many people are looking for land, so it was best to record a few sites that appealed to you before going back to the Land Office. Once there you encounter mass crowds of men doing just what you are doing. So, many slept on the steps to ensure access in the morning. Maybe you could talk someone into holding your space while you get something to eat or go to the bathroom. After all of this you may have to choose another property other than your first choice.

Now you are a landowner, only if you can prove up that to the government's rules. Hopefully you can get financing from family back east to buy a plough, horses, seed, etc. to start the process. Many repeated the trip back east and then returned the following spring with equipment. Unfortunately, this venture for many was a one-way street, they have gotten out here but not much money and low skill level. Even with the skills and money return on investment is 2 years away. Nice part is no land tax other than sweat tax. Neighbours became friends as the old saying "misery loves company" applies and since money could not purchase labour you traded yours for theirs. Knowledge could be shared, skills could be learned, and before you know it a community is formed. This venture by today's standards makes perfect business sense. No debt, no labour costs, free resources equal a viable long range investment plan.

The most important thing was a mate that had the same vision as moving into a one room shack with blankets for room division, hauling water by hand, cutting and splitting wood for fires, plus innumerable other chores and tasks took a special woman. Then there was the business of catching and flinging out of bed those obnoxious pests that fly and crawl. Your new address was a few roman numerals on a steel spike. This does not even, in a small way, depict the pitfalls and challenges of our pioneers. At this point I will leave it to your imagination to complete this tale. When I think of the perseverance of the families that are still on the land, and the idea that for all that history you still make the same wage as 1972.

It is fun to put yourself in these pioneer's lives if it is from the pages of a book, in front of a good fire with a coffee at your elbow, but maybe we should try to walk in their shoes.

Thought it would be fun to find out how we got here. Just another Musing...Enjoy



The 2024 Priddis & Millarville Fair was a resounding success, marked by record-breaking attendance and a vibrant display of community spirit! The weekend had excellent weather, save for a brief shower on Saturday that did not dampen spirits during the pie and quilt auction.

The Fair was a true intergenerational affair, with both young and old immersing themselves in the experience of exhibiting, volunteering, and attending the Fair.

- 4400 guests on Saturday and 2500 on Sunday (record attendance on both days)
- 2075 ribbons were awarded to celebrate the talents of our 511 exhibitors and competitors
- 408 participants received prize payouts. 41 received over \$100

What a tremendous effort by this community, from donors and sponsors to our hundreds of volunteers. The Fair is a testament to the power of community and the joy of shared achievements, with numerous events and competitions showcasing the best of our local culture and creativity. Thank you to our generous sponsors and volunteers! Financial and in-kind contributions, as well as volunteer time and effort, make this event possible.


