MRAS President, Brent Foster, shared that our 1500+ volunteers gifted over 25,000 hours to MRAS. MRAS is community based, like I have mentioned before. We are only as strong as the team we have. With that in mind, we are fast approaching our AGM and we are looking for team members. Do you have some time to contribute? Skills, knowledge, experience and interest that could be of benefit for MRAS? We'd like to see you join us as many hands make a lot of fun as demonstrated by our own Mrs. Claus!

As October enters, we say goodbye to another season of the <u>Farmers' Market</u>. This year's market saw an increase in visitors along with a few new vendors within the market family. It was a fantastic market season thanks to the tremendous effort of MRAS Staff (including the summer staff) and the many volunteers. It is such an amazing event, and often used as a model for other Farmers Markets within the province and in Canada.

The final weekend of the summer market season brings Thanksgiving. Of course, Thanksgiving is known for spending time with family, a feast and for sports fans....football. It's also an opportunity to celebrate, or perhaps just a thoughtful moment, to recognize and acknowledge what we are thankful for and perhaps what we are looking forward to beyond the beautiful Fall colours.

They all offer delicious products that are staples in our kitchen! In our short time here we've had a few new hot sauces made, two of which by MRAS vendors. We also have a seasoning company working on a product and another producer that uses our space to prep some of the ingredients for a line of dips. In the coming weeks, we have a previous client returning to do a batch of her jam. It is such a delicious place to be!

We are thankful for the opportunity to share this incredible place with others. Thank you for your support and contribution in MRAS, where community is defined by where the heart is.

Hello Equine Members,

The MRAS riding rules, and sign-up sheet have been developed to help our members have a safe and enjoyable time riding while also maintaining our building in good condition.

<u>Riding Rules:</u> These have been created and agreed upon to ensure everyone using the facility remains safe and that our facility can be kept in great condition. Please continue to follow the rules and encourage your fellow riders to follow the rules. Click <u>HERE</u> for the rules or go to:<u>https://www.millarvilleracetrack.com/equine/</u>.

<u>Booking Sheet:</u> Please use the booking sheet when you plan to ride and honor your time. This practice is in place to ensure fair usage of the facility and helps the maintenance team plan when they can be in the arena for maintenance.

<u>Manure:</u> Please continue to clean up after your horses. We know the vast majority of you are excellent at this, but it continues to be a problem.

#### \*\*NEW PROCESS\*\*

Remove your horse's manure from the arena using the <u>forks and pails</u> and transport it to the blue bins. <u>Pails</u> should not be used for storage of manure; it belongs in the blue bins.

### MILLARVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

### **FREDERICK NASH**

Frederick (Fred) Nash was a respected cowboy and Forest Ranger who was well known in the foothills of Millarville, Priddis, High River, Longview, Turner Valley Black Diamond, and Bragg Creek. Fred was born on November 2nd, 1894 in London, England. He was the son of Henry and Clara Nash of Islington, London, England. Fred immigrated to Canada as a young man and worked in the northern Ontario silver mines before heading west where he worked for horse trainer Neil Campbell near Okotoks. Fred gained superb horsemanship skills and trained and rode as a jockey for the Campbells. He stood 5'5" tall so he made an excellent jockey.

Fred was hired to work as a cowboy at the Bar U Ranch south of Longview and was a valued ranch hand. When the First World War was declared on July 28th, 1914, like so many other young men, Fred volunteered to serve. He signed his Attestation Papers at Calgary on January 25th, 1916 and received Regimental Number 117438. He found himself assigned to the 12thRegiment of the Canadian Mounted Rifles. Following his training, he boarded a troop ship on October 9th, 1915 bound for England. By January 30th, 1916 he was taken on strength with the 2nd, Battalion, Canadian Mounted Rifles. Pte. Nash served overseas for four years, mainly in France. His military file shows that on June 2nd, 1917 Fred visited Paris on a 10-day leave. He earned a Good Conduct Badge on May 1st, 1918 for his actions in the field of battle. As a result of the effects of having been gassed in 1916, Fred suffered defective vision in his left eye and it would tear up in the wind. He was struck off strength and honourably discharged on May 30th, 1919 at age 24.

After returning to Canada, Fred went back to work as a ranch hand at the Bar U Ranch where the ranch managers had held his job for him while he served is country overseas. The Olson family who were managing the ranch at the time employed Miss Florence Butterfield, a young lady, whom Fred had met in England and had persuaded to come to Canada. Fred and Florence were married in January of 1920 and lived in a small log house on the Bar U until they finished building their own home on their homestead. They had filed homestead rights on a quarter section of land on the south side of the Highwood River (NW ¼ Sec 13 Twp. 16 R3W5). As a Forest Ranger Fred was required to work only six months of the year so Fred and Florence spent the winter months on their own place. They added more quarters to their homestead and by 1921 they owned a full section of land that they later sold to Thorpe and Cartwright.

Fred joined the Alberta Forestry Service in 1921, as Assistant Ranger to Pete Leman. His first posting was at the Pekisko Ranger Station where he and Florence settled into a small house. It was 50 miles to High River, the nearest town and transportation in those days was by team and buggy or by saddle horse. In 1922 Fred was transferred to the Sentinel Ranger Station (Highwood) and was the Forest Ranger there until 1929. Fred was an excellent axe man and built many beautiful log buildings. He enjoyed his work with the Forestry and the outdoor life. Some of his duties included stringing many miles of telephone line through difficult terrain throughout his district. He built lookout cabins, barns, bridges and gates. He was an expert packer and an accomplished horseman. A barn that he built in 1923 at Sentinel Ranger Station was torn down by Bert Sheppard in the late 1950s and rebuilt at the Ings Creek Cow Camp on the OH Ranch. (Perhaps this cabin is still there). Fred and Florence's two daughters were born while they lived at Sentinel. Evelyn Hazel was born in 1923 and Irene Florence was born in 1925. As soon as the girls were old enough, they accompanied their dad while he performed his duties throughout his district. Both girls learned to ride, shoot, hunt big game, and pitch a camp just as well as Fred could. He also taught them the art of woodcraft. Both girls were excellent shots. Fred was very proud of them!

In February of 1929 the Fred was transferred to the Big Horn Ranger Station. This was a four-day trip from Sentinel by team and sleigh through deep snow and subzero temperatures. When the family arrived, they found the gravity fed water system had frozen and flooded the home. Thick ice covered the floor locking the chairs and table in a block of ice. They chopped the ice away as best they could and kept fire in the stove burning constantly to thaw the remaining accumulation of ice.

Fred carried out his duties at the Big Horn for 18 years. During this time there were three major forest fires - 1929, 1936, and 1940. Bert Sheppard recalls in his book Just About Nothing that the worst year for fire was the extremely dry year - 1936. Early in the summer clouds of smoke appeared in the southwest corner of Alberta from fires in the Castle River in Alberta, and in the Elk River Valley in B.C. The combined smoke from these fires darkened the sun and it appeared as a red glow in the sky. Fred's concern was that the fire would come through McPhail Pass at the head of McPhail Creek. He felt that if a couple of men were placed in the pass, near a little glacial lake that they could stop the fire from crossing into Alberta. Fred alerted the Forestry Head Office and asked for permission to send men to the head of McPhail Creek. His request was denied, and sure enough, on July 23rd the fire came through McPhail Pass and into Alberta. Fred then put his efforts into preventing the fire from coming over Rickert's Pass at the head of Mist Creek onto the headwaters of the Sheep River. Fred and a few men camped at Sheer Cliff Mountain (Gibralter) so that they could access the grassy pass on horses and prevent any approaching fire. Fred was known to be a hard riding man and during these fires he drove himself relentlessly. One newspaper reporter described him this way, "He came dashing up on horseback, his face black with smoke and grime and his horse played out. He dashed into the corral, unsaddled, threw his saddle on a fresh mount and galloped off back to the fire line!"

He was a good friend to the Stoneys (Stoney Nakoda First Nation) and was particularly fond of Peter Ear. Florence's hospitality was well known; she always had the kettle on and friends and strangers alike were invited in for a cup of tea and a bite to eat. Fred would show his big game trophies and tell of his experiences. Florence and the girls were with him when he shot the near record grizzly and the big cougar whose hides were on the living room wall. Later, he reluctantly parted with his grizzly hide when he was persuaded to allow it to be added to a wildlife museum in Copenhagen, Denmark.


The Canadian produced western movie "His Destiny" starring Neal Hart, Barbara Kent and Guy Weadick was filmed in the Highwood country in 1926 and released in December of 1928. Fred doubled for Barbara Kent. In one scene, following a dynamite explosion, the team bolted wildly out of control, causing Fred and the buckboard to plunge over Gunnery Grade into the Highwood River. It was a memorable experience that ended well.

A popular annual attraction in the Calgary Stampede parade was Fred leading a string of horses, complete with packs laden with fire fighting equipment and apparatus used in both the Forest Reserve and the National Parks by Alberta Rangers and National Park Wardens. After retirement, he continued to enter his pack string in the Calgary Stampede Parade accompanied by his daughters. The pack string stretched, out in a straight line of horses, top-packed with wildlife trophies, each diamond hitch perfectly tied. It was a colourful and interesting display.

Fred retired in 1947 and purchased land south of Bragg Creek that had previously been owned by Fred Edgar and later by Frank Wolfe. Fred and Florence Nash and girls were good neighbors to the Burbys and visited often and Fred liked to help at branding time. While living at this location, Fred took clients out from all over the world on big game hunting trips through the Canadian Rockies. From Bragg Creek, Fred and Florence moved to a small acreage at Forest Lawn, Calgary. After a brief illness, Fred passed away at the age of 61 on March 1st, 1952 and is interred in the Field of Honour in Burnsland Cemetery. After Fred's death, Florence spent the winter of 1952-53 as housekeeper on the Archie Hitchell ranch. She then moved to Edmonton where she worked as House Mother at the General Hospital for 14 years, retiring in 1967.

A plaque dedicated by the Province of Alberta to Fred and Florence Nash stands at "Nash Meadow" a beautiful spot at the site of the Big Horn Ranger station on the South Fork of the Sheep River where they spent so the majority of their years while Fred was a Forest Ranger.




