MILLARVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Millarville Historical Society wishes one and all a very Merry Christmas and a bountiful New Year

I thought it may be fun this Christmas to create a family in the Millarville area in 1890. This family is fictional, but I believe it gives the present feeling of how it was in the early years. Having forged west in the hopes of becoming landowners and to carry their destiny in their own pockets they brought values and mores from their birth homes into the wilderness.

A Christmas to Remember in Millarville

It was December 1890, and the Millarville valley lay blanketed in fresh snow, the rolling hills and pine forests glistening under a pale winter sun. For the MacAllister family, this would be their first Christmas in their new homestead. The small log cabin they had built in the spring stood sturdy against the cold, smoke curling from its chimney into the crisp air.

Inside, Eliza MacAllister was busy at the hearth, stirring a pot of stew made from the last of their preserved venison. The savory aroma filled the room, mingling with the faint scent of pine from the small tree Thomas and Annie had brought in that morning. Decorated with strings of popcorn and dried cranberries, it stood proudly in the corner, its top brushing the low ceiling.

"It's not much, but it feels like Christmas," Eliza said with a smile as she adjusted baby Clara on her hip.

James, seated by the fire, nodded thoughtfully. "We'll make it special. Even out here, miles from town, Christmas is what we make of it."

Preparing for the Day

The children had spent the morning collecting pinecones and sprigs of holly from the nearby woods to decorate the cabin. Annie carefully arranged the holly on the mantel, while Thomas fashioned a star from thin strips of birch bark to top the tree. James had cut a few thick logs for the fireplace, ensuring the family would stay warm through the night.

The MacAllisters didn't have much, but they had saved a few treasures for the occasion. Eliza had managed to sew small gifts for the children: a wool scarf for Thomas, mittens for Annie, and a soft flannel doll for Clara. In return, the children had secretly carved a wooden trinket box for their mother and a new pipe holder for their father, working late into the evenings after chores. As the sun dipped below the horizon, casting the valley in hues of pink and purple, James stepped outside to fetch more firewood. He paused for a moment, looking up at the endless stars that seemed brighter and closer than ever in the clear winter sky. The stillness was profound, broken only by the distant howl of a wolf.

Christmas Eve Surprise

After supper, the family gathered around the fireplace, their faces lit by its warm glow. James took out his fiddle and began to play a lively reel, the music filling the cozy cabin. Eliza clapped along, and the children danced, their laughter ringing out as they twirled around the room.

"Tell us a story, Papa," Annie begged once the music had ended.

James leaned back in his chair, stroking his beard. "All right, then. Have I ever told you about the Christmas when I was a boy back in Scotland?"

The children leaned in close as James recounted tales of snowy hills, bustling markets, and a grand feast shared with family. Though his childhood home was a world away, the warmth of those memories seemed to bridge the distance.

Just as the story ended, there came a knock at the door. The family exchanged surprised glances. Who could be visiting on such a cold, remote night?

James opened the door to find their neighbors, the O'Reillys, standing outside with wide smiles and a sled laden with gifts and treats. "We thought we'd stop by and share a bit of Christmas cheer," Mr. O'Reilly said, his voice booming with good humor.

The two families spent the rest of the evening together, sharing stories, singing carols, and exchanging small gifts. Mrs. O'Reilly brought out a tin of ginger biscuits, and Eliza served steaming mugs of tea sweetened with the last of their precious sugar.

A Morning of Gratitude

When Christmas morning arrived, the MacAllister children awoke to find their stockings—knitted by Eliza months earlier—filled with small surprises: an orange for each child, a rare and treasured treat; a few peppermint candies; and a polished stone James had found by the creek, which he'd carved into a smooth heart shape for Eliza. After breakfast, the family hitched their old sled to their cow, Bessie, and made their way to the church service at the Ranchers Hall. Though the journey was cold, the sight of other families arriving from across the valley warmed their spirits. Inside the tiny hall, voices rose together in hymns of gratitude and hope, filling the air with the true spirit of the season.

That night, back in their cabin, the MacAllisters sat quietly by the fire, content and full. The hardships of their first year on the land seemed distant as they reflected on the kindness of their neighbors and the simple joys they had shared.

"This was a good Christmas," James said softly, his arm around Eliza. "Not for the gifts, but for the love that surrounds us."

Eliza nodded, her eyes shining. "We have each other, and we have this land. That's more than enough."

Outside, the wind whispered through the pines, carrying the promise of many more Christmases to come.

A Tribute to Loraine Debnam

Sadly, Loraine passed away October 18, 2024. She was a MRAS Life Member since 2023. Her Racetrack contributions included many years volunteering at the Races & Fair, Appreciation Nights, and catering for numerous events. For many years, Loraine was an avid Priddis and Millarville Fair exhibitor. An amusing article written by Loraine in Going to the Fair titled Beginner's Luck is a timely reminder for others to participate in the yearly country fair. She championed and supported community projects and events such as 4-H. For more than eight years, Loraine wrote monthly editorials in the MRAS Track Watch, sharing her views on community issues.

Loraine was a memory bank of details and history, a consummate organizer, a sharer of wisdom and a source of logic and comfort. Fondly known as Mrs. D., she touched the lives of families whose children attended the Millarville Community School, where she worked faithfully for many years. Loraine was an exceptional listener and communicator. She was a strong supportive advocate for others and was "a force" in helping Millarville School attain Community School status in the early 1980's. Envisioning possibilities, Loraine helped create a better more connected community for everyone.

Loraine is truly missed by friends, relatives, co-workers, and neighbours.

Holly, Loraine's daughter, sent me this article that Loraine wrote many years ago for the MRAS Track Watch. It aptly demonstrates Loraine's incredible editorial expertise, inviting readers to seek out possibilities which might become a reality.

A Possibilitarian by Loraine Debnam

We were discussing our plans and goals for the upcoming year when my daughter remarked that I truly was a possibilitarian. It was a term that I had not heard before and questioned the source. She told me that it came from the writings of Dr. Norman Vincent Peale. This author, minister (and founder of Guideposts magazine which is non-denominational and inspirational) passed away nearly a quarter century ago but his philosophy continues to inspire new generations. His book, "The Power of Positive Thinking" was written in 1952 and stayed on the best seller list for 186 weeks. Statistics reveal that it has sold over 5 million copies and been translated into fifteen different languages. My daughter's reference was to his message "no matter how dark things seem to be, or actually are, raise your sights and see possibilities, always see them, for they are always there." I believe that and try to think that way, but it's certainly not always easy.

My dictionary says that a possibility is something that has the potential for favorable or interesting results, that it represents good future prospects and that it presents a good outlook for opportunities yet to come. I have a friend whose mantra seems to be "it is what it is" but that implies that nothing can be done to change the circumstance or issue. That is unacceptable to me since that attitude guarantees that the problem or difficulty will never be solved or fixed. Even though there may be challenges that we did not create or things that happen which are beyond our control, it is how we respond that fuels, nourishes and sustains a healthy attitude. Thinking positively takes practice and courage. Allowing your thoughts to be manipulated can be toxic.

It has been my experience that noxious attitudes occur in a variety of places. Firstly, the things we observe, read or hear (especially gossip) can influence our thoughts in negative ways. Do we really want a sixty second news clip, a headline on a tabloid magazine or an overheard conversation to define what is real for us? Can we let them disrupt our balance and destroy our center of gravity with their "spin"?

People can do that to us as well, I have found. The expectations of others may cause us to erect emotional walls of protection because we are captive to their vision of how things ought to be. Even though we may love them dearly, their judgmental, critical or close-minded attitudes cannot be allowed to divert us from who we really are, rather than what they think we are (or should be). These individuals are not supportive or positive; too often the result is old patterns of responding or old self-imposed guilt being resurrected. There's certainly nothing wrong with asking for help when problems seem to be overwhelming but we have to be courageous in tangible ways so that we remain empowered when we are seeking more affirmative outcomes. We all have gray spaces or days in our lives, but positive actions and deeds help us to change the focus and move forward. Changes happen one choice at a time. We have to believe that there are options which hold promise and potential. If we change our approach or perspective, I am certain there are always possibilities.


